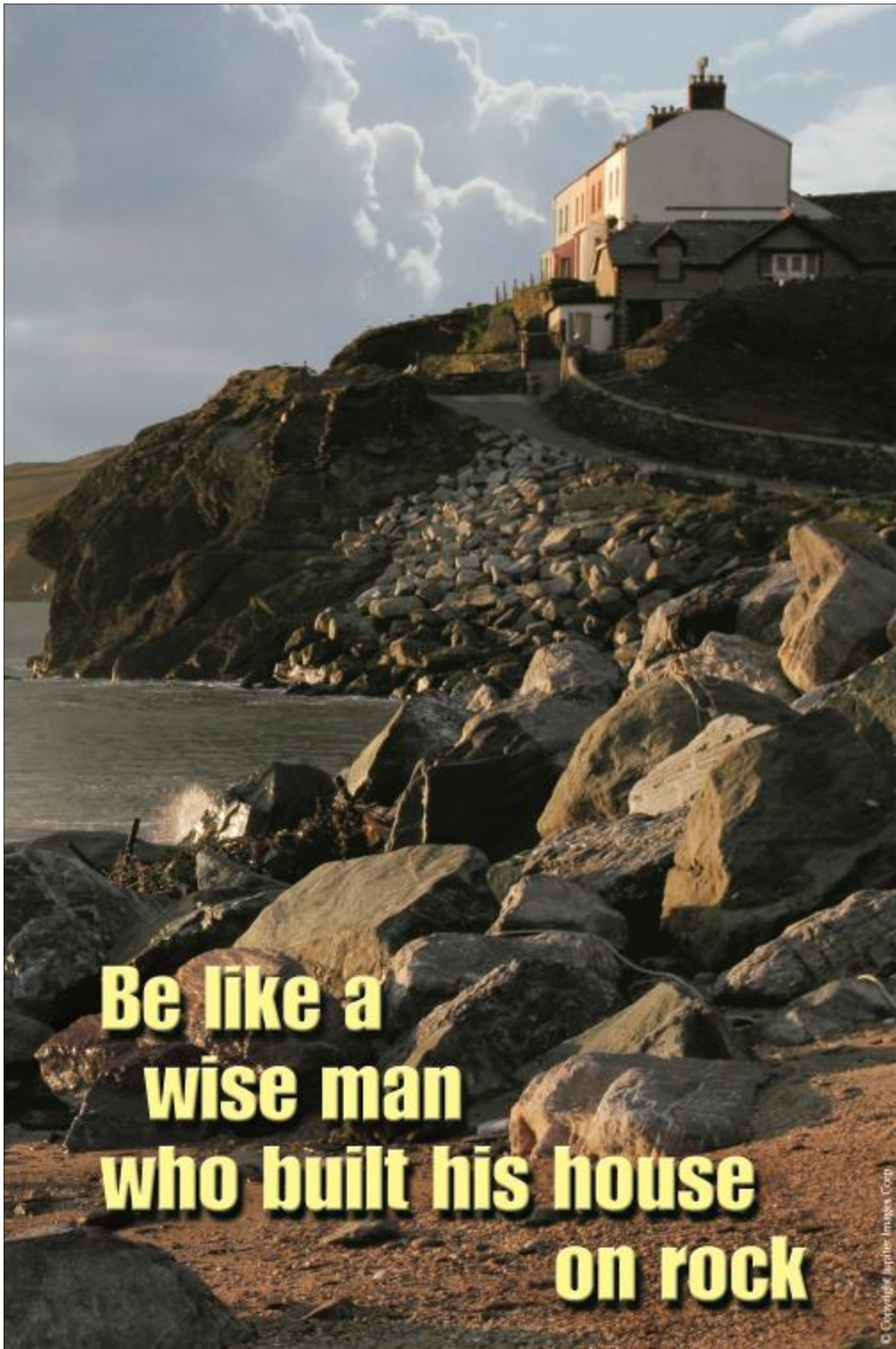

LIVING OUR FAITH



Dear Lenten People,

Our Lenten journey begins this week with Ash Wednesday. We are literally marked for the season of penance, forgiveness and probing deeply the areas of our life which need an overhauling.

What are the areas in my life that I hold onto (won't let go) which keep me from loving, living and forgiving? Many of us become our own worst enemy. Lent is a wonderful opportunity to "let go" and turn our lives over to the Lord Jesus. How do we do this? We need to keep life in perspective and realize God wants us to share our gifts. However, we are not the message; we are the Lord's messengers! Reflect (and smile) on the following:

1. *God wants spiritual fruit, not religious nuts!*
2. *Dear God, I have a problem, it's me.*
3. *Growing old is inevitable, growing up is optional.*
4. *There is no key to happiness. The door is always open.*
5. *Silence is often misinterpreted but never misquoted.*
6. *Do the math – count your blessings.*
7. *Faith is the ability to not panic.*
8. *Laugh every day; it's like inner jogging.*
9. *If you worry, you didn't pray. If you pray, don't worry.*
10. *As a child of God, prayer is kind of like calling home every day.*
11. *Blessed are the flexible for they shall not be bent out of shape.*
12. *The most important things in your home are the people.*
13. *When we get tangled up in our problems, be still. God wants us to be still so God can untangle the knot.*
14. *A grudge is a heavy thing to carry.*
15. *He who dies with the most toys is still dead.*

Along life's journey it is also important to realize we need each other. We are not built to be islands. As we gather around the Table of the Lord each weekend, we are the Church – The Body of Christ. We are nourished by the Word of God and the Holy Eucharist and then challenged to be Christ to all those we meet in the days ahead. We are the Church and Lent is a wonderful time to recommit our lives to the Lord within the Faith Community. The following story "speaks" volumes – read and pass it on ...

A man stopped going to church, so his pastor decided to pay him a home visit. It was a chilly evening and the pastor found him home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for the pastor's visit, the man welcomed him and they both sat quietly still by the fireplace, contemplating the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After a while, the pastor got up, reached for the tongs and carefully picked a burning ember from the flames, placing it on one side of the hearth. Then he returned to his chair, still silent. The host watched all this in quiet reflection. Momentarily, the lone ember glowed, but soon it flickered, died and became cold. Not a single word was exchanged since the initial greeting. The pastor soon glanced at his watch. Realizing it was time to leave, he stood up, picked up the cold, dead ember and returned it to the middle of the fire where it immediately began to glow brightly in the light and warmth of the burning coals surrounding it. As his pastor opened the door to leave, the man spoke with a tear running down his cheek, "Thank you for your visit and for your fiery homily. I'll be back at church next Sunday." Sometimes the very best homilies are the ones left unspoken. May we preach a homily with our lives.

And speaking of homilies, here are six things you'll probably never hear in Church from the congregation.

1. *Hey! It's my turn to sit in the front pew!*
2. *I was so enthralled, I never noticed your homily went 25 minutes.*
3. *Personally I find Evangelizing much more enjoyable than golf.*
4. *I've decided to give our church the \$500 a month I used to send to TV evangelists.*
5. *Since we're all here, let's start Mass early.*
6. *Father, we'd like to send you to this Bible seminar in Hawaii.*

Lenten Fast Regulations

Here are the Lenten Fast Regulations as published by the Office for Divine Worship of the Archdiocese of Chicago:

Abstinence from meats is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

The special Paschal fast and abstinence are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.

Knights of Columbus take top prize at Polar Plunge



The Knights of Columbus Evanston Council 1077 were the top fundraisers in the Special Olympics Illinois Law Enforcement Torch Run Polar Plunge held Saturday, February 26 on the icy shores of Lake Michigan at the North Beach at Northwestern University in Evanston. Regional Spelling Bee a clean sweep for PJ23

On Tuesday, February 15th, students from St. Joan of Arc, St. Joseph, St. Peter, St. Athanasius and Pope John XXIII Schools competed in the Knights of Columbus Spelling Bee held at St. Joan of Arc School. It was a very exciting and tense spelling bee with some very competent spellers from fifth to eighth grade. There were more than 30 representatives from the region. The number of representatives from each school was determined by the school's enrollment. Pope John was represented by nine winners of their in-school spelling bee.

By Round 4, many students had dropped out but there were still five students competing from Pope John XXIII—Uma Venkata, Brendan Scheib-Feeley and Saint Mary parishioners Caroline Granner, Rob Colgate and Henry Gawron. Only five students in total remained to compete in Round 5—and four of those students were from Pope John XXIII. From Round 6 to the final Round 15, all the remaining spellers were from Pope John XXIII. Fifth grader Brendan Scheib-Feeley took fourth place. Seventh grader Caroline Granner earned third place. Uma Venkata earned second place and Rob Colgate won first place by spelling correctly the two final words: *crepuscular* and *aquiline*. These two top spellers will represent Pope John XXIII at the Sectional Spelling Bee to be held in Glenview. Good luck to both Rob and Uma!

RCIA UPDATE Rite of Sending – Rite of Election



Today, Cardinal George will welcome those sent by their parishes to gather together with their god-parents and sponsors in what is known as the Rite of Election and the Call to Continuing Conversion.

The Rite of Sending, ordinarily held earlier the same day, here at Saint Mary's at our 11 a.m. Mass, offers our parish community an opportunity to acknowledge the spiritual progress the catechumens and candidates have made, to express our approval of their election or recognition, and to send them forth to our bishop with assurance of our parish's care and support.

For those who have been baptized, they are already among the elect in Christ. These individuals, also known as candidates, are "called to continuing conversion," and thus their intention to be fully initiated and share in the Eucharist is recognized. This Rite of the Call to Continuing Conversion also takes place before the bishop. Together with the elect, the candidates are thereby moved by this Rite into a period of intense spiritual preparation.

During these coming weeks of Lent, let us pray for our catechumen, John Fuller, and for our candidates, Brooke Klinker, Kurt Noble, Jan Durham and Michelle Mehlis. Let us ask the Lord for them and for ourselves, to be renewed by one another's efforts so that together we may come to share the joys of Easter.

RESPECT LIFE

Pornography, the quiet plague, a quintessential Respect Life issue

(Part 3 of 3) Following are closing excerpts from a 2008 United States Council of Catholic Bishops Secretariat of Pro-life Activities publication titled *Pornography: What's the Problem?* (http://www.usccb.org/prolife/programs/rlp/houck_pamphlet.pdf). The focus is on help and hope.

There are practical measures that offer significant hope for those struggling with pornography. Here are five ways that those addicted to pornography can begin the recovery process:

1. *Decide to get well and resolve to stop viewing all forms of pornography.*
2. *Remove all sources of temptation that may prevent one from healing.*
3. *Be willing to make sacrifices, which may involve changing current duties or habits.*
4. *Become familiar with the process by which one begins to repeat addictive behavior.*
5. *Find a support group or a network of "solid" people to help in one's recovery.*

The publication also addresses pornography on a supernatural level:

Without God's grace, those seeking freedom from pornography addiction may find the five basic steps just outlined very difficult. Fortunately, all believers can seek grace by

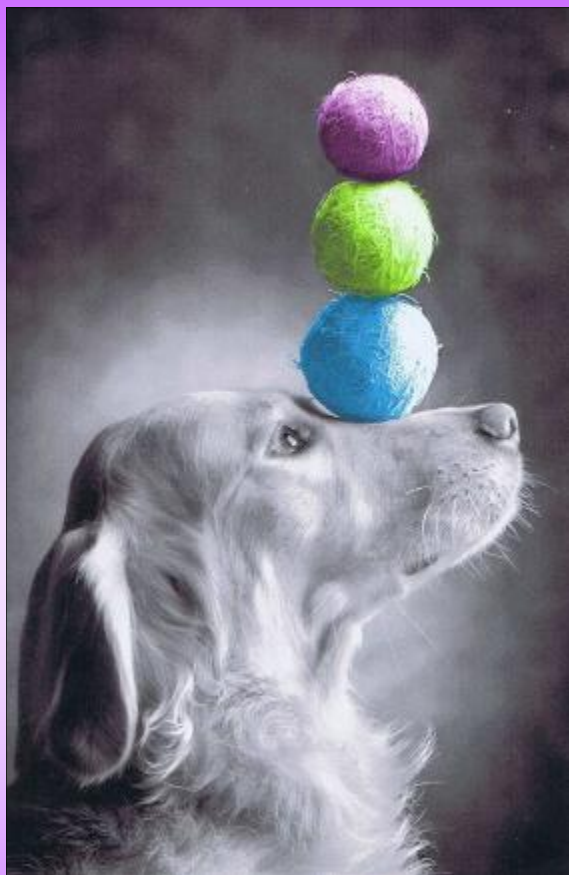
6. *Praying daily*
7. *Seeking education and formation in the virtues*
8. *Practicing patience and perseverance (Self-mastery is the work of a lifetime)*
9. *Turning one's thoughts to God's merciful love when tormented during recovery with images and temptations*
10. *Additionally, Catholics are blessed to be able to partake frequently in two great sources of sacramental grace: the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Communion.*

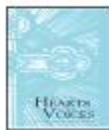
